Do You Know...

A Citizen's Role in the Comprehensive Plan Process?

Many citizens become familiar with the operations of the Planning & Zoning Commission only when an action is under consideration that directly affects where they live. At times, they make decisions that are the most controversial and garner headlines.

In reality, P&Z does more than rezone property. They are responsible for developing a document that, as required by state law, "serves as the guide for public and private actions and decisions to assure the development of public and private property in the most appropriate relationships." This document, known as the Comprehensive Plan (or "Comp Plan"), is written to forecast a planning period covering 20 years and must be reviewed every five years. The Comprehensive Plan for Woodford County was last updated in 2018, meaning we are set to begin another review period.

The Goals & Objectives portion of the Comp Plan set the tone for the rest of the document, which will include a lot of updated demographic data, a transportation plan and a land-use plan. Public input is important throughout the process but is most critical in drafting the Goals & Objectives, which is the only part of the plan that requires approval by the Fiscal Court and the City Councils. To that end, a series of public meetings have been conducted to allow residents to share with hired facilitators from the Kentucky League of Cities what they would like to see considered in the plan draft. Once the Goals & Objectives have been formally adopted, the Planning Commission will begin updating the various elements of the Comprehensive Plan, including, but not limited to, sections on Transportation, Community Facilities, and Land Use. Additional elements relating to Tourism, Economic Development, and Housing may be considered this time as well.

Please follow https://woodfordplanning.org to stay up to date as the process moves along this year. You can also reach out to the Mayor or City Council members with thoughts about what you think should be addressed in the Comp Plan.



good things happening in the community >>> Smart Water Meters Update!

Many of you will have already had your existing water meter switched out for a new "smart meter," which we've written about in previous newsletters. At this writing, 66% of households that get their water from Versailles Municipal Utilities have the new meters with the remainder expected to be installed by the end of May. Some households <u>may</u> see an increase in their bills. Rest assured that the city did not increase water or sewer rates to pay for the new meters so unless you have a leak – which the smart meters will help identify in real time – modest increases are likely due to the improved accuracy of your new meter as your old meter may have slowed down over time.

Attention Woodford County Homeowners!



Did you know that you could reduce your property tax bill if you are 65 years or older?

Woodford County, Versailles and Midway homeowners 65 years or older who own their own home that was their primary residence as of January 1, 2023, could qualify for the Homestead Exemption! The Kentucky Department of Revenue sets the exemption amount every two years and for 2023 and 2024, will reduce your taxable property value by \$46,350 – an increase of \$5,850 compared to the 2021 and 2022 exemption. The Homestead Exemption will save you approximately \$460 on your property tax bill!

The Property Valuation Office administers the program and has a short application for the homeowner to complete; all you need to bring is your driver's license with the same property address listed. If you are turning 65 in 2023, you do not have to wait until your birthday to apply! You only need to apply once; you do not have to reapply unless you sell your house or move. The Woodford County PVA, John Paul Coyle, is happy to answer any questions you may have. If you have been determined to be totally and permanently disabled by the Social Security Administration, the Kentucky Retirement System or Veterans Affairs and you own and reside in your Woodford County home as of January 1, you may also be eligible for the Homestead Exemption.

Training is a Priority for the Versailles Fire Department!

The Versailles Fire Department takes pride in training regularly to provide the best service to its community. Career firefighters are required to maintain a minimum of 100 hours of fire-related continuing education annually, and volunteers and part-time firefighters 20 hours. This, of course, is in addition to the hours required to become certified in the first place. Last year, ten department members logged more than 400 hours each of fire training. Each year, the member with the most training hours wins the "Workhorse Award." In 2022, Lt. Bryan Arnett won the award with 675 fire training hours!

Every first and third Monday of the month, Versailles Fire Department holds a training night for all staff at the training station on Huntertown Road to stay fresh and learn new fire and rescue tactics. Here's an example: On April 17, the Versailles Fire Department received two vehicle donations to perform auto extrication training. Auto extrication is the process of freeing victims from the wreckage in motor vehicle accidents.

The on-duty crew spent most of the day setting up the two vehicles to simulate a real-life motor vehicle accident. When the training began at 6:30 pm, department members were told they were going to perform the simulation as if it were a real-life incident. The members were split into two crews; each crew had a different extrication task to complete. One used extrication tools (the "Jaws of Life") to open a car with mangled doors; the other extricated a victim trapped between the ground and the vehicle by properly setting up rescue struts to stabilize the vehicle and keep it from rolling back over.

Once finished, the crews reset the props so that they could switch and perform the other incident. When the simulation was complete, they continued to learn all the ways to cut on a vehicle using both battery-powered and hydraulic tools. They learned to remove a victim trapped under the steering wheel (called "rolling the dash") and to remove a roof. They even removed the trunk of a vehicle as if it were the only means of gaining access to the victim!

When the training was over, the members and instructors had a post-incident debriefing, just like after a real incident. They discussed everything that had happened, what could have been done differently, and what new tactics had been learned. No one ever wants to be in a motor vehicle accident but should the worse happen, Versailles Fire Department personnel are trained to work collaboratively, quickly, and effectively to save lives.





The rescue pumper offers more compartment space that allows the department to carry an assortment of tools while not compromising space needed for water, hoses, etc. This one piece of equipment is in service 24/7 and available to respond immediately to any hazmat, rescue, or fire suppression situation.

Police Department Update

The Versailles Police Department has two good things to tell you about! **Flock License Plate Readers** – Seventy percent of crimes involve one or more vehicles. Our recently-acquired Flock License Plate Readers have already led to a number of arrests, the recovery of stolen vehicles, and the recovery and safe return of endangered and missing juveniles. Flock License Plate Readers have raised some privacy concerns, but know that they are <u>never</u> used for traffic enforcement and do not take pictures of drivers or passengers. They read license plates only and flag vehicles suspected of being involved in a crime.

Victim Advocate – Newly-hired Victim Advocate, Ellie Castle, is already making a difference in Woodford County. The Victim Advocate offers assistance, support, and resources to crime victims and victims of other traumatic events. She also helps victims navigate the criminal justice system, which can be overwhelming, and is available to answers questions day or night. The Victim Advocate provides information on crime victim rights, crime protections, crime prevention, safety planning and shelter, as well as notifies victims regarding an inmate's release, escape, and court appearances.

Lights Downtown!

The City of Versailles has partnered with the Tourism Commission to share the cost of putting lights on downtown buildings from the corner of Rose Hill/Morgan to St. John's Episcopal Church. The lights have been ordered and are expected to be attached to the tops of downtown buildings soon, possibly as early as this month.

The lights will be powered by solar boxes, which will save on electricity costs and be better for the environment. The lights put up downtown over the holidays were very popular and many in the community weighed in that they'd like to see lights year-round.

As downtown Versailles is revitalized, we want residents and visitors alike to enjoy what our town has to offer in a magical, festive setting. The total project is \$24,000, with Tourism contributing \$11,000 and the city covering the rest, which includes lights on the municipal building (city hall) and in its courtyard.
