### **Public Comment**

No public comment was received.

MOTION BY DAKE, SECONDED BY BINGHAM TO APPROVE AND ADOPT THE MINUTES OF THE JUNE 20, 2023 REGULAR MEETING OF THE COUNCIL.

The vote was as follows: Bingham, Dake, Jones, and Miller voting aye. Council members Bradley and Johnson abstained.

Ken Kerkhoff, Chair of the Downtown Revitalization Ad Hoc Committee provided a Downtown Revitalization Project update. Mr. Kerkhoff stated that he had met with and secured funding from several private donors and those donors would be recognized on the Legacy Arch. He noted that the placement of the Legacy Arch has been changed from the original design phase and moved closer to Main Street. He also discussed the Woodford Reserve Photo Op which is in the process of being finalized with representatives from Woodford Reserve. Mr. Kerkhoff mentioned the need for a name for the area, noting that it could be as simple as Versailles Entertainment Destination District. He stated that the work for underground line excavation is progressing and the next phase of work is to demolish the old police evidence building and begin work on the ADA compliant walkway. He noted that the Historical Society will still be open and accessible during the construction.

Mr. Kerkhoff stated that he expects the electric line work on Granducci Alley to be over budget but that they will save significantly on other changes that have been made during the design process. He noted that he expects the City's end contribution total to be around \$2 million which is much less than the original budgeted amount of \$3.68 million.

At the request of council member Bradley, City Attorney Moore provided second reading of Ordinance 2023-13 Amending the City of Versailles, Kentucky Annual General Fund Budget for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023 by Estimating Revenues and Appropriations for the Operation of City Government Services, as follows:

Mayor Traugott also presented the Architectural Contract from Michael McCoy for the Safe Room project. He noted that there are few architects in the United States that are familiar with the solid dome structure and that Michael McCoy answered the RFQ for this project and has experience.

MOTION BY BRADLEY, SECONDED BY JOHNSON TO APPROVE THE ARCHITECTURAL CONTRACT WITH MICHAEL MCCOY FOR THE SAFE ROOM PROJECT.

Assistant Fire Chief Brandon Brown presented a quote from Jon Cheatham Architect in the amount of \$9,000.00 for the Station 1 Renovations. The quote includes preparation of construction documents, mechanical, electrical, plumbing engineering and structural engineering. He noted that once this is complete the project will be able to be put out for bids.

MOTION BY BINGHAM, SECONDED BY BRADLEY TO ACCEPT AND APPROVE THE QUOTE AS PRESENTED BY JON CHEATHAM ARCHITECT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$9,000.00 FOR THE PREPARATION OF CONSTRUCTION DOCUMENTS AND ENGINEERING WORK AS IT RELATES TO STATION 1 IMPROVEMENTS.

Mayor Traugott stated that last night's July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration was extremely successful. He praised Event Coordinator Katie Cooley along with all of the volunteers for their work on the event. He noted that the photo booth was very popular as well as the Veterans Tent.

He stated that the City of Versailles is a co-applicant in a Planning and Zoning hearing to be held on July 13<sup>th</sup>.

Mayor Traugott brought up the previously discussed Landlord Tenant Act and stated that he thought a public hearing should be held.

He referenced the recent news story regarding a Kentucky Avenue property that has received several complaints. He noted that the City is working through the process and that it is estate owned and has not had water or electric service in over a year and has received a condemnation notice. He stated that the goal is to come to a resolution that doesn't cost the taxpayers.

## **Council Miscellaneous/ Committee Reports**

Council member Dake stated that the fourth issue of the City newsletter went out on Friday, June 30th.

Ms. Dake noted that a Downtown Revitalization Ad Hoc Committee meeting will be held tomorrow at noon in the council chambers.

Ms. Dake referenced a message she recently received from Theresa Thomas with the Bluegrass Council for the Blind stating a Versailles resident had requested audible signals at street lights specifically by the current High School and by the Versailles Police Station. Mayor Traugott noted that the City doesn't own any of the crossing signals and that they had requested the audible signals from the State a few years ago with no response.

Council member Johnson thanked the Mayor and Council for the wind chimes she recently received in memory of her father, Paul Caswell, who passed away on June  $22^{nd}$ .

Council member Miller stated that the Streets and Stormwater Committee recently met and the discussion items are still in progress.

Ms. Miller asked if a walk through of the underground pathway, that runs under Main Street, could be scheduled prior to the July 11<sup>th</sup> work session.
