

Woodford County is Recovery Ready!

Thanks to a suggestion by Mayor Traugott and many hours of work by community members, Woodford County was recently certified as the third Recovery Ready community in Kentucky. Recovery Ready focuses on three areas: **Prevention, Treatment and Recovery Support.** Certified communities confirm they have adequate available resources in the areas of community support, education, peer support, healthcare accessibility, harm reduction and legal guidance to increase success rates among people with substance use disorders. New City Website is Live!

The new website is attractive and easy to navigate and – most importantly – should efficiently connect residents to programs, services, and other information they need. Some new features:

- Home page with easy links to bid announcements, forms, events, grant opportunities, public service announcements; past and present issues of the city newsletter, etc.;
- City's Facebook page embedded on the site;
- Fillable forms (like the Business Registration form) that can be submitted electronically;
- Online bill pay (water/sewer and property taxes)

Did you know that the City of Versailles has more than 600 fire hydrants?



Seeing Red? It might be the Fire Hydrants!



Over the years, most of Versailles' fire hydrants had faded to a dull pink color and really weren't very eye-catching.

Now, thanks to a partnership with the Woodford County High School Athletic Boosters Club, student athletes are painting the hydrants all over the city, earning \$20 for the Club for every hydrant prepped, cleaned,

and painted! Around 250 have already been painted, and completion of the rest is expected in the spring. In addition to the per-hydrant donation to the Boosters, the city is providing the paint and other materials, which is still a big cost savings over using city employees or hiring an outside company to do the work. And the WCHS Athletic Boosters Club will earn about \$12,000 to help support local student athletes!



FALL: Cooler Weather, Pumpkin Spice and LEAVES!

Likely one of the City's most popular services is leaf pickup. From mid-October to early January, you will see the leaf truck(s) traverse the city vacuuming up leaf piles in front of people's homes. The trucks – there is a second truck during peak times, which is about mid-November – start at one end of the city and work their way to the other end, then start all over again! The leaf truck runs five days a week.

The city has about 50 miles of streets, so depending on how much has been raked and is at the curbs, this process might take 2-3 days or longer, up to 10 days.

Some common questions:

Can I make an appointment to get my leaves picked up on a certain day? No. The truck works its way through town and will get to you, but it is not an on-demand service.

The leaf truck drove by my house and didn't pick up my leaves. Why? The leaf truck doesn't skip houses. You may be confusing the leaf truck with the limb truck, or "chipper truck," because they look very similar. The chipper truck picks up fallen limbs that are placed at the curb if the limbs are no more than 6" in diameter and 7' long. More on this equally popular service in another newsletter!

I'm pretty sure it was the leaf truck! Why didn't it pick up my leaves?

The leaf truck can't vacuum your leaves if there is a vehicle or vehicles blocking the way. Please make sure there are no vehicles parked at the curb if you have leaves you want picked up. Also, residents shouldn't mix anything in with their leaves, like limbs/branches, grass clippings or brush. The vacuum cannot handle these types of vegetation. Leaf truck operators try to put a note on doors to let people know this was an issue.

What happens to the leaves after they are picked up? The leaves are ground up in the leaf truck and delivered to the recycling center where they are mixed in with the brush there and turned into mulch. This process keeps the leaves out of the landfill AND out of the city's storm system so is better for the environment and the city's underground infrastructure.

Downtown Revitalization Project Update!

After several months of basically watching the Rose Hill parking lot being TORN UP, residents can now see something being BUILT UP! The Farmers Market Pavilion's foundation has been poured, making it easier to imagine a building on that spot. Work also continues in the alleyway behind the Main Street businesses, where the jumble of unsightly power

and telecommunication lines will be buried underground. This is a slow process because of the number of lines and needing to work with business owners to limit disruptions.

At this time, it looks like the large American Elm in the middle of the project area will be saved. The construction crew will do their best to route the ADA-compliant walkway (that will lead down to the "water feature") around the tree without damaging its root system. The city is thrilled that the walkway will connect people to Big Spring Park, which will be undergoing its own revitalization soon. More on that in the next newsletter.

Finally, we are working with plant experts to figure out what native Kentucky trees, shrubs, grasses, and flowers will work best on the hillside that leads down to the water. Once planting begins in the spring, it might be a while before it looks lush and beautiful. Plants don't grow overnight, but we're pleased with the interest in that area because we anticipate it will be an excellent place to take photos! 
From the Mayor
