Did You Know... Your Neighborhood Can Apply for a Grant from the City?

The City of Versailles has allocated \$50,000 in its FY23 budget for neighborhoods within the city limits to apply for up to \$7,500 in grant funding.

The Neighborhood Grant Program began last year and has funded several projects in the following priority areas: public safety; promotion of health and wellness; improved recreation; beautification; and promotion of inclusiveness.

Projects must generally benefit the entire neighborhood (e.g., landscaping at the entrance) and have at least three households interested in pursuing the project. If the cost is expected to be above \$7,500, the neighborhood must explain how the rest will be paid. Please contact Assistant City Clerk Ariel O'Reel at City Hall with questions. Upgrade! Smart Water Meters

Occasionally, City residents open their water bills and find an unpleasant surprise – a large bill that usually indicates a leak. Because the City doesn't credit water charges, homeowners and renters are left paying for water that never went through their pipes but instead seeped into the ground or behind their walls. We are happy to report that these surprise bills will soon be a thing of the past.

Last fall, the City awarded a contract to the CITCO Company for the implementation of an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) water meter reading system. While installation of some new water meters and transmitters has begun, most of the residential work should begin later this year.

This is Versailles Municipal Utilities' first major water meter replacement program since 2000. AMI meters, or "smart" meters, as they are commonly referred to, are read remotely from our office, eliminating the need for water department personnel physically going to each meter. The way that meters are currently read takes two people 7-8 workdays.

Since most of the meters being replaced have been in use between 15 and 20 years, billing will be more accurate since water meters may slow down over time.

Although the City will use one reading per month for billing

purposes, each meter is actually read multiple times each day, which will enable the City to identify and contact customers about significant leaks soon after they occur instead of discovering them when monthly readings are made.

Supply chain issues have delayed the full implementation of the new system, but it should be fully operational in early 2023. And more good news: residents' water bills will not increase to pay for this project. The meters are being purchased with money the City has been saving for this purpose; the installation will be paid for from its ARPA funds.

Pandemic Relief

The pandemic was a tough time for many in our community, and particularly for those who worked in the service sectors. We recognized early on that if the City didn't respond that our friends and neighbors might face eviction, disconnected utilities, etc. The U.S. Treasury guidelines for pandemic relief allowed local governments to support their residents, so over the past two years, the Versailles City Council has approved a total of \$220,000 to help qualified individuals living within the city limits with rent and utilities.

The money came from the City's federal CARES* funds for the first round then its ARPA** funds for the second. Funding ended June 30, 2022, but the City is proud to announce that from July 2020 through June 2022, it awarded \$210,024 assisting 1,296 residents from 503 households. (Ten thousand dollars went to Bluegrass Community Action to administer the program on the City's behalf.) The number of residents equates to approximately 13% of the City's population.

Sidewalk Talk

Many of you have heard about the new sidewalk that will be constructed along the east side of High Street from the end of the current sidewalk at Minary Avenue to the Falling Springs bypass, a project funded equally by the County and the City. You may also have noticed sections of new sidewalk in the Southland subdivision, on Rose Hill Avenue, and on Clifton Road to replace broken or buckled sidewalks that posed trip hazards.

What you may not know is that sidewalk upkeep is typically the responsibility of the owners of the property adjacent to the sidewalk. As sidewalks deteriorate, however, property owners often call the City to fix or replace them. Given the cost of sidewalk repair or replacement, many decide to put it off. If a goal is to be a walkable city, it's important that walkers feel safe, especially older people and those with balance issues or other mobility limitations.

With that goal in mind, the City approved a sidewalk replacement program to which the city budgets a set amount per year to pay for new sidewalks where the need is greatest. The three streets mentioned above were in that category and were included in this year's budget, which is now depleted.

By June 30, 2023, the City will complete an inventory of sidewalks within the city limits and assign them a grade from A to D, with a "D" sidewalk described as one with "major deterioration or contains cracks / changes in elevation that exceed 1". Sidewalks in the poorest condition will be prioritized to be replaced in next year's budget.

In addition, property owners with sidewalks graded B-D (but who are not on the priority list) can **cost share** the repair or replacement of their sidewalks with the City. This is a win for everyone: the property owner, the City and the people who walk to get places or for exercise. Contact Assistant Public Works Director Dan Knight for more information.
