City leaf pickup begins October 14th and runs through the first week of January!

In the meantime, bag your leaves and put them out on trash day. The leaf truck can't vacuum your leaves if there is a vehicle (or a dog!) blocking the way. Residents shouldn't mix anything in with their leaves, like limbs/branches, grass clippings, or brush. The vacuum cannot handle these types of vegetation. Leaf truck operators try to put a note on doors to let people know this was an issue.

Nonprofit Spotlight: Safe Haven Baby Boxes!

You may have read in the *Woodford Sun* that the Versailles Fire Department is raising money to install a Safe Haven Baby Box at Station #1 on Locust Street, which is currently undergoing renovation. When an infant is placed in a baby box, a silent alarm is tripped so the baby can be attended to immediately.

Safe Haven Baby Boxes is a 501c3 nonprofit whose mission is to prevent the illegal abandonment of newborns by raising awareness, offering a free 24-hour hotline for mothers in crisis and offering Baby Boxes as a last resort option for women who want to maintain complete anonymity. The Safe Haven Baby Box takes the face-to-face interaction out of the surrender and protects the mother from being seen.

Versailles Fire Department's Station 1 is getting a Makeover!

The improvements at Station 1 on Locust Street can be summarized as a redesign of the exterior facade, a remodel of the interior living space, and the construction of additional office space. The VFD's goal is to optimize the square footage without changing the footprint so the building has a natural flow for those who work and live there daily. With the improvements, the building is expected to serve in its new capacity for another 60 years. Upon completion, the station will gain the following amenities:

Downstairs:

- New professionally designed kitchen and living area
- Locker room
- New gym space with optimized square footage and ceiling height
- Public entry / reception area

Upstairs:

- Three additional office spaces and a conference room
- Kitchenette
- Improved living/sleeping quarters

With some fundraising success, the Versailles Fire Department will also add a Safe Haven Baby Box! See the Nonprofit Spotlight in this newsletter for more info. A Baby Box costs about \$25,000.





Manufactured Housing – what it is and isn't – and a Pilot Project Planned for Versailles!

Sometime in October, a new home will appear on an empty lot (owned by the City of Versailles) at 274 High Street. The home, a Qualified Manufactured Home, will look like the picture below and will serve as a model so residents can view this type of housing before it is eventually sold. Read on for more information!



Proposed manufactured home at 274 High Street

What is a qualified manufactured home? This type of home meets the criteria of an off-site constructed HUD home, so is a new unit that meets or exceeds the HUD code for construction and safety and has an A1 certification label. This home will:

- Be affixed to a permanent foundation;
- Have a roof constructed of composite material (such as asphalt shingles) with a minimum roof pitch of a five-foot rise to a twelve-foot run;
- Have a minimum roof overhang of no less than six inches;
- Has a width of at least 20 feet at its smallest width measurement;
- Is oriented on the lot so that the main entrance door faces the street;
- Has a minimum total living area of 1,200 square feet (this home will have 1,941 square feet);
- Has a perimeter skirting of masonry or similar material that harmonizes with the architectural style of the home and other residences in the same area;
- Has conventional residential siding.

Is it the same thing as a mobile home or trailer? No! A mobile home is a structure manufactured <u>prior</u> to June 15, 1976, that was not required to be constructed in accordance with the National Manufactured Housing Construction in Safety Standards Act, that is transportable in one or more sections, that, in the traveling mode is eight body feet or more in width and 40 body feet or more in length, or when erected on site, is 400 or more square feet. It is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling on a temporary or permanent foundation. It does not meet the definition of a Manufactured Home.

What features do most new manufactured homes have? In every way, this home will look and feel like a home built on-site. New manufactured housing is energy efficient, is solid construction and is built to last. This home will include a driveway and landscaping.

When will it be placed on the lot? The home will serve as a model for the Kentucky Manufactured Housing Institute at the Kentucky League of Cities' fall conference in Lexington in late September. After the conference, it will be placed in Versailles. Work has already begun on permitting, placement of footers, etc. It will likely take almost a month before it is ready to show.

How can I get to see it? Details are still in the works, but plans are to have knowledgeable volunteers staff weekend Open Houses so residents can view the home – inside and out – and check out its construction and amenities. The Open House period will likely run about six weekends.

What if I am interested in buying it after the Open House period? The city plans to engage a nonprofit consultant to facilitate the sale, taking the city totally out of the process. Again, details are still being finalized, but there will likely be a maximum income level to be eligible to buy this home, as well as other stipulations. These might include the home serving as a primary residence only and not as a rental and requiring that the buyer qualify for a mortgage him/herself. The price of the home hasn't been established yet but will be more affordable than many new homes in Woodford County.

From the Mayor

This issue of the city newsletter will be the last one where I'll be featured as Mayor. I've had a lot of questions about the process for choosing a replacement. The decision lies with the city council. I cannot appoint or cast a vote for anyone. If the council doesn't vote someone in within 30 days of my resignation (October 1st), the decision will be made by the governor.

One recent item that deserves more attention than it's gotten is the reduction in city taxes! The city's Real Property Tax Rate went from 5.5 cents on every \$100 of real property assessment subject to being taxed to 5.0 cents. What does this mean? If your house is valued at \$300,000, your city tax bill will go from \$165 to and \$150/year. So, for every \$100,000 of property value, your bill will go down \$5. It's not a lot in a total family budget, but better than the other direction!

Finally, I'd like to congratulate Assistant Police Chief Rob Young and Detective Nathan Craig of the Versailles Police Department. They will be recognized in Washington, DC, in September for exemplary work in the Brian Carroll explosives case back in 2021, which culminated in Carroll's arrest at UK Hospital. The Johnny A. Masengale Memorial Award is sponsored by the ATF and recognizes the contributions and untimely death of Mr. Masengale, an explosives expert, in 1992, by honoring law enforcement officials who go above and beyond working on cases related to explosives. We are proud of these two brave officers and the VPD!
