

New WC High School opens its doors to students on January 8th!

Assuming the weather cooperates, students will return from winter break on January 8th. The big change is that the new high school will open for classes for the first time!

The high school is next to the middle school so please be mindful of new traffic patterns around the schools – High Street / McCowans Ferry; Falling Springs Blvd.; Troy Pike; and Tyrone Pike, in particular – and heavier traffic volumes in the morning and at dismissal time.

Watch for school buses and vehicles whose drivers might be unfamiliar with the drop-off routine as well as for students who may be walking or biking to school.

Based on the schools' start and dismissal times, please give yourself a little extra time if you're traveling in this area from about 7:30 to 8:45 am and 2:45-4:00 pm!



City Hires New Code Enforcement Officer!

Nonprofit Spotlight: The (Warming) Station at Living Grace Church



Woodford County is lucky to have a place for people who are without shelter to sleep during cold weather.

Called The Station, the beds are housed within Living Grace Church, which is located at 128 E Green St in downtown Versailles.

The Station is the brainchild of Living Grace Paster Jo Lauderdale and Judge-Executive James Kay, who were dismayed by the death last February of a city

resident who died of exposure, at least in part. There were a few meetings of people who were motivated to find a better solution for those struggling with homelessness or housing insecurity. The Station was opened as a "gap measure" until a long-term solution is found.

As is the case for most nonprofits, **VOLUNTEERS** are The Station's biggest need. Currently, there are just five. Two volunteers are needed to stay the night, with one remaining awake at all times. Interested? Call Jo Lauderdale at 859-421-4103!

The particulars:

- *The Station is open from November 1 March 31 WHEN NIGHTTIME TEMPS FALL BELOW 32 DEGREES.
- *Hours are 7 pm until 8 am. (The Station's Conditional Use Permit is designated as "Emergency and Temporary" so it can only be open limited hours, number of months, and in dangerously cold temperature.)
- *Guests are greeted with a hot meal and can help themselves to snacks and drinks throughout the night. They can charge their devices and watch TV. They wake up to hot coffee and breakfast.
- *The Station can accommodate up to 10 guests.

Versailles has a New Police Chief!

While he's in a new position, Versailles Police Chief Rob Young is a familiar face to many, having served as Assistant Police Chief since 2018! With former Chief Mike Murray's retirement at the end of the year, it made sense to promote Chief Young to provide the Versailles Police Department (VPD) the continuity and stability an experienced leader like him provides.

Chief Young graduated from Rider University in Lawrenceville, NJ, in 1990 with a degree in Accounting. He worked as an accountant right out of college for the CPA firm Grant Thornton, but decided accounting was not for him so began a law enforcement career in 1992 as a Federal Special Agent for the Office of Inspector General in New York City. Chief Young served in that role until 1998 when he became a Special Agent with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives and moved to Lexington, KY. As an ATF

Special Agent, Chief Young was an explosives canine handler, member of the National Response Team, and Certified Explosives Specialist. He retired in 2017 as the Resident Agent in Charge of the Lexington Field Office. However, after only a month of retirement, he decided he wanted to continue serving and was hired by the VPD as a Detective, and, in 2018, was asked by Chief Murray to be Assistant Chief.

Chief Young is married to Tamie and together they have two young adult sons. Congratulations, Chief Young!

The City receives Grant Funding – learn more about its recent TAP Grant award!



Wilson Avenue (located between Laval Heights and Woodford Plaza at Lexington Road and Wilson)

What is a TAP grant? TAP stands for Transportation Alternatives Program and is under the US Dept of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration. The program "provides funding for a variety of generally smaller-scale transportation projects such as pedestrian and bicycle facilities; construction of turnouts, overlooks, and viewing areas; community improvements such as historic preservation and vegetation management; environmental mitigation related to stormwater and habitat connectivity; recreational trails; safe routes to school projects; and vulnerable road user safety assessments."

What will Versailles' TAP funding be used for? Thanks to this area being assessed during late 2023's Walkability Audit, Wilson Avenue was identified as a site for sidewalk and other improvements. City / county engineer Mary Beth Robson prepared the grant application. The improvements include:

*5' wide concrete sidewalks (@1,000 ft), including connecting sidewalks where there are none

*Erosion control *Entrance pavement *New storm inlets

*Curb and gutters *New storm pipe *Retaining wall (less than 4' high)

*Earthwork *Sodding *Detectable warnings (ADA)

How much will this project cost? The total cost of the project is \$401,960. Federal grants typically pay 80% of the cost, so the federal share is \$321,568 and the local share \$80,392.

When will this project begin? The design work should begin in February 2025. We hope it will be built this year, but state approvals take a while to get, so it's safer to say that the project will be finished in 2026.

Why are these grants important? Infrastructure improvements are hugely expensive and beyond the budgets of most, if not all, municipalities. While local governments have "skin in the game" with their local matches, they often depend on federal and state grant opportunities for big projects to improve public safety, building resilient infrastructure, and strengthen equity for all residents.


Will the city pursue more of these TAP grants? This is not its first TAP award and won't be its last!
