City Matters

Informing and engaging residents of Versailles and Woodford County, Kentucky

The City is building an Auto Parts Store! (Just Kidding! That's a Joke! Hahaha!)



The yet-unnamed road includes a roundabout to facilitate smooth, efficient movement of vehicles and to prevent "stacking" on US 60. Kroger is on the left. The road continues north beyond the roundabout to the future entrance of TKC Distilling Co. There are also three stub streets on the road's east side that will lead to a large commercial development with plans to begin construction in early 2026.

In the two previous newsletters, we told you about changes coming to the intersection of US 60, Marsailles Road, and Kroger Way. The picture shows the newly completed road, which includes a roundabout that most of us have likely driven around!

There has been a lot of speculation about which retailers will be coming to the commercial development to the east of the new road, but despite what some people seem to believe, the City has no say as to who these retailers will be! This is always the case unless the City owns the property. Otherwise, as a privately-owned development, the owners decide which businesses open there. (The City does disallow adult entertainment establishments.)

Land is zoned for certain types of development – residential, commercial (or business), industrial, professional office, and agricultural. Within these zones, there may be subsections, (particularly in residential zones, where the subsections define how many homes can be placed on an acre or if the zone allows multifamily housing). As long as developers' building plans are in accordance with the zone the property is in – and meet other requirements as well – they try to attract businesses that both believe can succeed. And if that's an auto parts store, then so be it!



The City plants 40 trees!

The City recently planted FORTY red oaks and bald cypresses along the two-mile stretch of the Falling Springs Bypass. They were planted, staked, and mulched thanks to the efforts of the City of Versailles' "streets crew" who did the lion's share of the work in less than two days.

Kudos, too, to Master Gardeners' Debbie Tichenor and Sue Van Patten for their help and expertise in proper planting techniques and a shoutout to MacDougals for digging the holes (with a machine), which made the planting much faster and easier!

Funding for the trees came from three sources:

- *\$2,500 via a Kentucky Utilities "Plant for the Planet" grant
- *\$2,500 from the City (the grant had a match component)
- *\$5,000 from Estepp's fueling center on Tyrone near the FS Bypass Let's enjoy watching them grow and adding beauty to the bypass!

This year, Frontier Nursing University (FNU) celebrates the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Frontier Nursing Service (FNS) in 1925 in Hyden, Kentucky. In 1939, FNS started the Frontier Graduate School of Midwifery – now known as Frontier Nursing University, the oldest and largest continually operating nurse-midwifery education program in the U.S.

The need for more space led to the purchase of the property in Versailles in 2017. Renovation and construction began in 2018; a ribbon-cutting ceremony in 2022 officially marked the opening of the new campus.

With a current enrollment of more than 2,700 students representing every state in the country, FNU's community-based distance education model enables them to perform most of their coursework while continuing to live in their home communities. Students come to campus twice during their studies at Frontier, a steady cycle throughout the year.

FNU offers post-graduate – its students are already nurses – degrees and certificates beyond midwifery, including Family Nurse Practitioner; Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, and Women's Health Care Nurse Practitioner.

FNU has quickly become part of the Versailles community by participating in events like the Twilight Festival and Chamber health-and-wellness focused events. FNU is a legacy partner for the downtown revitalization project and awards an annual scholarship to a WCHS senior who intends to study nursing.








Another "Two Minutes with the Mayor" Follow-up: Our State & City Roads!



Road resurfacing on Versailles Road in Woodford County

On September 18th, the mayor spoke with Assistant Public Works Director Dan Knight during "Two Minutes with the Mayor" on a topic they both hear about often: **ROADS!** A synopsis of their conversation is below, or you can watch the video on the city's Facebook page (at City of Versailles, Kentucky).

Why can't the City repave Lexington Road, Main Street, etc., etc.? They need it!

The City is not allowed to maintain any roads owned by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. "State roads" include many of our most heavily traveled: Lexington Rd/St; North and South Main; Rose Hill; High Street; Frankfort Street, Falling Springs Boulevard, and more. The state prioritizes its road projects according to pavement conditions. You can see the map for our area (and the rest of the state) here: https://maps.kytc.ky.gov/pavementconditions/. The red lines indicate roads that are being prioritized for resurfacing or repaving. Green lines indicate roads that are in decent shape.

I see some red lines in Versailles! Which roads are these?

Recently, Versailles Road (US 60) near the Bluegrass Parkway was repaved. You may have noticed! Plans are to continue this work all the way to the Fayette County line. Once this work is completed, the state has identified additional work in town, including a total rehab of Lexington Road/Street, North Main Street, and Frankfort Street. This will be a complicated project because it isn't just a resurfacing (renewing the top layer of asphalt) but replacing the old pavement completely. This is generally done when a road is severely damaged or at the end of its lifespan.

When will the work in town begin?

We aren't 100% sure, but we think by summer 2026. The money has been allocated for the work.

There is a state maintenance garage on Crossfield Drive. What do they do there?

These state employees drive around Woodford County daily to fix immediate needs, like potholes. They are also responsible for plowing snow on state roads.
